



From Douglas Gander of The WORDsmith, Westport Ont.

At age 19 Raphael Kerem began a Farming apprenticeship in Kanton Zurich, Switzerland. A love for cattle, and traditional life in the Alps, convinced him to continue with studies in cheesemaking at the Plantahof in Landquart, Graubonden, and the Bergbauren Schule in Hondrich Born Schule in Hondrich, Bern.

For 5 summers he was employed as "Senn" (Herdsman - cheesemaker) in Glarus and Berner Oberland. He was twice the recipient of the highest award in the Alpmulchenwettbewerb" or government sponsored cheesemaking competition in Kanton Bern.



Using a copper "Käse Kessel" he makes a variation of "Berner Alpküse" or "Brienzer Mütschli", a half hard cheese in rounds of 1 - 3 kg. The cheese requires 6 - 8 weeks of ageing. He has made cheese for many immigrant farmers in Eastern Ontario for over 20 years. See ad page 3.



Raphael and his wife Tanya are a multitalented couple, who practice a number of traditional trades, which include furniture *Tanya Kerem* Traditional trades, which include furniture making, wood turning, bookbinding and broom making. Their workshops and showroom are located in a beautiful heritage building, the village cheese factory of Burridge (between Westport and Godfrey, Ontario), a scenic $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour drive west of Ottawa in the Rideau Lakes district.

Deutsches aus Ottawa – die wöchentliche am Sonntag leichte Unterhaltungs-Sendung.

Habe mich wiedermal mit jemand übers Thema, "Deutsches aus Ottawa" (DT/OTT) unterhalten. Wir konnten uns einigen, daß Radiozuhörer sich doch selten Gedanken darüber machen wieviel Arbeit eigentlich damit verbunden ist eine Sendung zusammen zustellen.

Im Frühjahr, während der Spendenaktion für die Sendung "Deutsches aus Ottawa", nicht die für den Sender CHUO, sprach ich von einer Wiederholung im September, daß zu der Zeit sich ausdrücklich nur die Zuhörer an der Spendenaktion für "Deutsches aus Ottawas" beteiligen, die es im Frühjahr versäumt haben. Nach dem Motto \$1.-/Mon. oder \$12.fürs Jahr. Die Frühjahrs-Aktion war ziemlich erfolgreich, weil Spender tiefer in die Tasche griffen als erwartet. Die \$1.-/Mon. Idee/Lösung als Unterstützung, wurde als machbar aufgegriffen, ließ aber zu wünschen übrig, da die Beteiligung sehr gering war.

Der September ist hier, erwartungsgemäß sollte die Spendenaktion, während der Sendung, vom Stapel rollen. Unerwartetenweise zeigte mir CHUOs Management die rote Karte. In strengstem Ton wurde mir gesagt, daß es nicht erlaubt ist für finanzielle Unterstützung für "Deutshes aus Ottawa" während der Sendung zu werben. Schade, denn die Notwendigkeit der Beihilfe besteht und bleibt nach wie vor ein akutes Problem. Der genaue Wortlaut war: I cannot condone this and you may not solicit them over the air. All of our programmers donate their time and energy to create the shows that make up CHUO. As a not-for-profit business we can accept donations - as an individual you have no legal basis for this.

Egal was CHUO sagt, die Sendung DT/OTT ist ein wöchentliches leichtes Unterhaltungsprogramm in Wort und Musik, für das Allgemeingut der Deutschen und deutschsprechenden Gesellschaft in Ottawa und Umgebung. Wie andere, die von ihrer Zeit für gute Zwecke geben, so ist auch meine Zeit zu verstehen. Die zahlreichen Unkosten die für die Sendung entstehen, möchte, sollte, könnte, müßte allerdings von der Gemeinde gedeckt werden. Ich sehe nicht ein, daß das auch noch aus eigenen Mitteln finanziert sein muß. Die Unkosten pro Sendung betragen durchschnittlich \$50.- oder \$2600.-/Jahr. Das sind nur die rohen Unkosten zusammengefaßt. Über 10 Jahre läppert sich das in eine

ansehliche Summe zusammen, trotz der von Zeit zu Zeit (bislang etwa \$6000.-) Gutmütigkeit der Gemeinde.

Um das Weiterleben Sendung der zu garantieren muß die Ğemeinde einen Weg für eine Weiterfinanzierung erstmals finden, diejenigen die sich im Frühjahr nicht beteiligen konnten, denn ich bin nicht mehr in der Lage Unkosten aŭs die eigener Kraft zu bewältigen, werde es nicht. Die auch vorrübergehende Frühjahrslösung muß sich in eine permanente gerechte Lösung ĕrgeben.



2000 Swiss Farms Lost Every Year!

No other branch of industry in this country of ours has changed its structures as drastically as farming. Despite this, our farmers are constantly being criticised by politicians and economists. But the farming tradition has the backing of the Swiss people.

This statistic is so incredible you have to read it twice: Switzerland loses five farms every day. That amounts to nearly 2,000 farming businesses a year in the Mittelland – the heartland of the country – and in the hills and mountains. So, in other words, on any one day five farming families have to give everything up and stand by helplessly as their possessions, animals and equipment are sold to the highest bidders. Tears and sadness are etched on the faces of farmers, many of whose forefathers have run the farms for generations.



As the trade association Economiesuisse

repeatedly emphasises, structural changes in farming are "not quick enough and not bold enough". The association argues that the current agricultural industry is too small in structure and not productive enough. It views the creation of larger farms as a matter "of key importance", and regards a free trade agreement with the European Union for all agricultural products as "the only way ahead".

The "Neue Zürcher Zeitung" newspaper made the sarcastic comment that "being a farmer is not a matter of fate. Nobody is forced to remain a farmer for ever."

Probably no other branch of industry in our country has experienced such a radical structural transformation as farming. The number of farms has fallen from roughly 93,000 in 1990 to 65,000 last year – a 30 percent drop. In the same period, the number of people employed in farming has also plummeted from 253,000 to around 190,000 – down some 25 percent. But that is not the end of it: because of the 2011 agricultural reform programme, every day over the next few years five to ten farming families will have to throw in the towel. According to Manfred Bötsch, Director of the Swiss Federal Office for Agriculture, this would mean "that 15,000 to 20,000 farms will be abandoned inside ten years." His personal view on the matter: "The pruning measures demanded by farming are higher than they have ever been in the industry."

LUNENBURG - Lunenburgers should draw a big circle on their calendars around the date July 24, 2010.

24, 2010. If all goes well, that is the day that a third schooner Bluenose will slip down the ways at the former Smith and Rhuland Shipyard where the original Queen of the Atlantic was launched in 1921 along with her namesake 42 years later.

namesake 42 years rater. It's a dream that Dartmouth resident Joan Roué, great-granddaughter of William Roué, the architect who designed the original ship, has had for a long time

time. "It's been a lifelong passion of mine," said Ms Roué, who over a decade ago wrote a book about her great-grandfather's part in the legacy of the original vessel. "It's just common sense that with Bluenose II being 43 years old, and yes it's been klcked around that there needs to be a replacement vessel. I think it's time to stop kicking it around and do it so that we're not putting ourselves as Nova Scotians in a position of not having a Bluenose at some point in the near future." Last week, Ms. Roué

in the near future." Last week, Ms Roué announced the formation of a firm called Schooner Bluenose Trading Company Inc., whose goal is to raise the estimated \$15 million necessary to complete the project. Along with a "Sponsor-Ship" program that is designed to encouragecommercial and individual contributions to the project, there will also be a number of annual events which Ms Roué said she hopeswill help raise additional funding. Those include a national Dime

raise additional funding. Those include a national Dime Day to be held for four years beginning in 2007 each March 26, the anniversary of the date of B I ue n o se's I a u n c h. Schoolchildren will be asked to support the vessel's construction by donating a dime. A complete study and assignment package will be developed and made available for teachers across the country. country.

A Bluenose Hall of Fame is also being planned, with the inaugural induction ceremonies scheduled for October 27, 2006, the week that the annual International Fishermen's Trophy races were held from 1920 to 1938.

Ms Roué said preliminary discussions have been held with the Town of Lunenburg about constructing the vessel in Bluenose's home port. Ideally the former Smith and Rhuland shipyard would be the best location location.

How appropriate it would be to be able to do number 3 at the same site that number 1 and number 2 were," she said, adding that the town would remain the new ship's home port.

home port. Plans are in the works for the construction of Bluenose III, slated to be launched in 2010, which will serve as a replacement for its predecessor, the now 43-year-old Bluenose II. Robert Hirtle photo "We're going to follow with tradition," Ms Roué said. "Everything that we're doing, we're tying in with history as closely as we can. There's no reason for Bluenose to leave Lunenburg. Lunenburg has served her well." While Ms Roué said informal discussions have been held with several local boat building concerns, nothing has been

finalized as to who will be chosen to construct the new ship.

"We know that the trade is still there, that there are still skilled there, that there are still skilled tradespeople that are able to build that boat," she said. "That's not the top of our list right now. Right now our main goal is to get the project out there, get the fundraising campaign off the ground. In our time line, we've dedicated the second year of the project to assembling the people and the materials that we're going to need for the construction."

While the Province of Nova Scotia owns and operates Bluenose II, Ms Roué owns the "intellectual properties," including construction rights, for the plans and designs of Bluenose.

She said she has kept the province informed of plans to build the new vessel, and in July formally invited government to collaborate on the project.

collaborate on the project. "We expect a positive response from the province," she said. "Especially in consideration of the obvious substantial educational and economic benefits this project offers the province and its people, both during the construction and beyond, benefits that reach further than the necessary preservation of our heritage and culture." Her company has not asked for

Her company has not asked for financial assistance from the province, but has only asked to use the name and marks it has registered under the Bluenosename.

Bluenosename. Ms Roué said once the vessel is completed, it could serve in the capacity as a floating ambassador for Nova Scotia as duties of its predecessor are scaled down, and she is possibly retired to a permanent berth in Lunenburg "with all the accolades and regalia she deserves." she deserves.

Tall Ship Event Planned

LUNENBURG - A fleet of tall ships may be appearing on the Lunenburg waterfront's horizon during the summer of 2007.

Next July, the American Sail Training Association will be organizing another edition of its popular Tall Ships Challenge, which will begin in the United States and wind its way up the east coast of North America to Halifax, as it did during its previous visits in 2000 and 2004.

Lunenburg recreation director Robin Scott said last week the Waterfront Development Corporation Limited (WDCL) is in the process of organizing next summer's event, which will hopefully include a number of ships visiting other venues, including Lunenburg ships visit Lunenburg.

"What they want to try and do is use that opportunity to disperse the ships to a variety of ports after Halifax, basically to promote tourism and the seafaring nature of

the province," Mr. Scott explains. "They think at this point there is going to be about 10 of each [class] for a total of about 30 tall ships E and of those, a significant number will want to stay around for a few days and visit ports on the southeast and southwest coasts of Nova Scotia."

Government statistics show that during their last visit two years ago, vessels involved in the Tall Ships Challenge drew over a half-million additional visitors to the Halifax waterfront and contributed over \$18 million to the local economy

It also provided a boost to the Lunenburg area when 10 tall ships, led by the town's own barque Picton Castle, converged on the town's waterfront for three days in early August of that year, following the traditional salipast in Halifax harbour.

sailpast in Halifax harbour. Among the vessels involved in the local stop was the Gazella, the oldest and largest square-rigged sailing ship in the world with a continuous sailing history. Exactly what tall ships will be visiting Lunenburg next year and the precise dates they will be in town have yet to be worked out. However, Mr. Scott says he and representatives from a number of ports in southwestern Nova Scotia met with representatives of the WDCL in June and another meeting is slated for later this summer to begin planning the event. "There are a variety of concerns with

"There are a variety of concerns with respect to each of the ports with [regard] to security and infrastructure, and how this can be made to work to promote not only tourism, but a little economic E spinoff as well," he says, adding that the WDCL's long-term plan is to make the ships' visit an ongoing, regular event. "Everything is all pretty tentative, but at

iong-term plan is to make the ships' visit an ongoing, regular event. "Everything is all pretty tentative, but at least they're poking the ashes to see what comes out of it," he adds. Mayor Laurence Mawhinney says council has passed a motion in support of partnering with the Lunenburg Board of Trade and the Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic in hosting the event, "as we did the last time tall ships were on the South Shore. "That was very successful," he recalls. "We would expect with the same kind of advanced planning it would again have the same degree of success, and be a real attraction for the tourism industry on the South Shore." Should plans for the event come to fruition, the timing of the ships' visit could coincide with the arrival of the S.V. Concordia, flagship of West Island College International's Class Afloat Sea School, which is due to make Lunenburg its home port in 2007. Class Afloat officially relocated its offices

Class Afloat officially relocated its offices from Montreal to Lunenburg earlier this month in preparation of beginning classes at Lunenburg Academy next fall.

The Lost Homeland recounts the lifestyle and customs of the last century. It is the true life story of John Schmidt, who was born and grew up in a German village in an area that is now Poland. In simple, easy to-understand language, Schmidt describes the circumstances that existed in his village before the Second World War. 

New Ferries for British Colombia

from the Newsletter of the German Embassy Ottawa BC Ferries recently announced that after nearly two years of design work and testing, construction of the new Super C-class vessel, Coastal Renaissance, began on August 29 at *Flensburger Schiffbau-Gesellschaft Shipyards (FSG), in northern Germany.* The landmark event was marked by a special steel-cutting ceremony involving representatives from BC Ferries and the shipyard. "This is a major milestone in our fleet renewal program and we are very excited about beginning construction of these new ships," said David L. Hahn, BC Ferries' President and CEO. "The three new Super C-class vessels will usher in a new era in ferry transportation on the coast and are the cornerstone of our plan to replace 22 vessels over the next 15 years. "The first ship, Coastal Renaissance, will take approximately 12 months to build, with delivery to B.C. expected in late 2007. By the summer of 2008, all three Super C-vessels will be plying the waters of Georgia Strait to provide a whole new experience for west coast travellers. Also in August, BC Ferries announced that it had commissioned the

experience for west coast travellers. Also in August, BC Ferries announced that it had commissioned the building of another new vessel to replace the 40-year-old Queen of Prince Rupert operating in northern B.C. Following a rigorous competitive bidding process, the company again selected FSG of Germany to build the new modern vessel. The contract, with a total value of 91.8 million Euros or approximately \$133 million Cdn (based on current exchange rates), was on current exchange rates), wa approved in mid-August by BC Ferries Board of Directors.
