Canadian Pension - Income Splitting

Effective for the 2007 taxation year, a Canadian resident individual earning eligible pension income will be able to allocate (for tax purposes only) up to 50% of that income to a spouse or common-law partner (resident in Canada). The definition of eligible pension income varies according to the age of the individual earning the income rather than the age of the spouse with whom the income is being split.



New German Cinema at the Goethe-Institut Montréal September 13 – December 14, 2007

Along with German expressionism, New German Cinema is one of the most important and well-known periods in the history of German cinema. Twenty-six young filmmakers signed the Oberhausen Manifesto in 1962



which called for the renewal of German cinema, and thus was born the New German Cinema. The movement reached its prime in the 1970s with directors such as R.W. Fassbinder, Werner Herzog, Volker Schlöndorff, Alexander Kluge and Hans-Jürgen Syberberg. While there were no common styles or forms, several common themes existed, including the critical examination of recent German history and social problems.



"Gorch Fock" visit to Halifax October 20 - 24, 2007

After visiting Halifax once this summer already, as well as St. John's and Quebéc City the "Gorch Fock" will visit Halifax one more time before leaving Canadian waters. The sail training ship of the Navy German (Deutsche Marine), is a warship under sail and

unarmed, "Gorch Fock" - very much like the Canadian tallship "Bluenose", is a major attraction for the local population and tourists alike when calling at any port.

As Germany had lost all its school ships as war reparations after World War II, the German Navy decided in 1957 to have a new training vessel. One year later the ship was built for 8,5 million DM. Since that time the "Gorch Fock" has been in continuous service as a sail training ship, with more than 11.000 cadets having been trained on it during that time.

It is named in honour of the German writer Johann Kinau who wrote under the pseudonym "Gorch Fock".



The "Ottawa Valley Swiss Club" has continued, for several generations, to help members keep in touch, celebrate and transmit their Swiss heritage.





Important Notice about the Issue of New Passports as of November 1, 2007

On 1 November 2007 a new Passports Act enters into force. One of its requirements is that new German passports (bordeaux red cover) should contain a chip with the holder's fingerprints.

Owing to technical problems in introducing the new regulations, for several months as from 1 November 2007 the German missions in Canada are likely to be

unable to process applications for new passports. Temporary passports (green cover) and children's passports, however, will not be affected.

If your current passport is due to expire before mid-2008, we therefore

strongly advise you to apply for a new passport before 15 October 2007. If you apply for a new passport after 15 October 2007, it is likely that the German missions in Canada will initially only be able to issue a temporary passport (valid for one year maximum). Such a temporary passport does not entitle you to visa-free entry into the United States of America.

We would be grateful if you could pass this information on to your German friends and acquaintances.

Best Lecturer Creates Scholarship for Study in Germany

Toronto's Ryerson University student Julian Reid was selected by a committee of Ryerson professors to receive the Department of History's inaugural History Travel Award this spring. The scholarship was established by history professor Arne Kislenko with seed funding from a \$10,000 CAN TD Meloche Monnex scholarship, awarded to Ryerson University when he won TVOntario's first Best Lecturer competition in November 2005. The faculty as well as Ryerson's history department contributed to the scholarship, which, when matched by the provincial government's Ontario Trust for Student Support program, brought the endowed award to over \$30,000.

"This award is not only about recognizing student academic achievement; it was created to encourage Ryerson students to explore the world and further their curiosity in it," says Kislenko.

Reid, who specialized in global studies in his degree, will spend a month from July 21 to August 18 in Berlin studying history through the Freie Universität Berlin International Summer University program. He will have the opportunity to learn about a different culture, live in the heart of one of Europe's most cosmopolitan cities and travel to different European countries after he finishes his studies. The \$6,500 CAN award will cover his tuition, accomodation and part of his travel expenses. Reid, who is graduating this spring, will receive an independent study credit for his studies in Berlin.

Many universities, including Ryerson, offer courses and programmes of study overseas, notably in France, the United Kingdom and Italy, among other countries. However, comparably few universities focus on Germany. As Professor Kislenko has strong professional and personal ties to Germany, encouraging students to study there seemed like an obvious choice. New Bluenose Forced to Change Name

appears that Bluenose III has been sunk before it ever hit the water, at least in name.

Joan Roué, president and CEO of Queen of the North Atlantic Enterprises Inc., announced a year ago her company intended to build a second replica of Bluenose, the famous saltbank racing schooner designed by

her great-grandfather, William J. Roué, and launched in Lunenburg 86 years ago.

The new vessel, to be named Bluenose III, was slated to be built at Snyder's Shipyard in Dayspring, with the keel laying set for next summer in advance of a July 24, 2010, launch.

While preparation of the site where the ship will be built has begun and Ms Roué says everything with regard to the construction of the vessel is a go, the group has run into one small snag regarding her name.

She will still be a Bluenose, just not Bluenose III as originally planned.

"The way it works with federal ships registry is you make your application and you have to submit more than one choice," Ms Roué

explained last week. "They told me Bluenose III wasn't available and they approved Bluenose IV, which was my second choice."

Ms Roué said that as far as she knows, the name Bluenose III was registered to the Province of Nova Scotia, and although they are disappointed that the moniker is not available, her group is moving on with the project regardless.

She said while the actual building which the new vessel will be constructed in will not be put up until after the keel is laid next year, there is a significant amount of preparation work that needs to be carried out at the site CEO of Queen of the North in advance of that event.

"The building platform is half

built now and it's in the large boat shed at Snyder's," she said. "It's only half built because that's as big as the building will accommodate. It's 80 feet long, sheets of plywood end to end and 32 feet wide. Obviously, it's got to be twice as big to build the vessel on."

She said that will be moved to the DAYSPRING - It construction site once preparation of that area is completed, a process that involves infilling, levelling and making accommodations for slipways and other facilities necessary to launch the ship.

> "There are engineers working on those things now," she added.

With regard to raising the estimated \$15 million necessary to complete the project, Ms Roué said she has been pleased with the group's efforts haven't been able to go out and Jim Eisenhauer, chairman of to date, even though they "really beat the bushes hard.

"We had to make sure we had our ducks in a row ... but the interest that we've had and the support that we've had has been phenomenal to date," she said. "At this stage of the game, we're looking ahead, we're not looking back, and we're moving forward."

Clearwater Brings Shellfishing Management Operations to Lunenburg

LUNENBURG - When the Development Waterfront Corporation (WDC) and the Waterfront Lunenburg Association Inc. (LWAI) acquired the old Scotia Trawler office building from Clearwater Fine Foods as part of their \$5.5 million waterfront purchase in August 2005, they never took the sign off the door.

Maybe they knew something.

On Tuesday a deal was reached between the three parties that will see Clearwater merge the fleet management of Canadian and Argentinian shell fishing activities and relocate them to Lunenburg.

The agreement saw Clearwater sign a building and land lease

for а property located at 250 Montague Street, ironically the one the company operated as the office for its Scotia Trawler Ltd. operations until they vacated it January 2006.

Along with relocating their shellfish management centre to Lunenburg, the firm is also planning on basing a research vessel in the port.

Mike Pittman, vice-president of fleet operations for Clearwater, said in a press release that amalgamating Clearwater's shellfish fleet management in Lunenburg will "strengthen the performance of the business.

"We are pleased that Lunenburg has proven to be the logical location for Clearwater to locate this portion of the business," he said. "Clearwater has been supportive of Lunenburg for many years and looks forward to continuing being part of the community."

While the company sold 17 parcels of land, including 22 buildings and eight wharves to the WDC two years ago, they did retain a presence in the town, continuing to manage their scallop-fishing fleet from the one building they retained on Montague Street.

Jim Eisenhauer, chairman of the Lunenburg Waterfront Association, said he is pleased the deal has been completed.

"Clearwater has been an important player on the Lunenburg waterfront and this revitalization and growth is a welcome and positive step forward to revitalizing Lunenburg's working waterfront.

Nova Scotia Economic Development Minister Richard Hurlburt agreed, saying he is "pleased Clearwater seafoods is increasing its presence in this historic waterfront.

"The growth of marine industries like Clearwater fits exactly with the vision the Town of Lunenburg has for its working waterfront."

According to the WDC, "significant upgrades" will be carried out on the building. In the interim, Scott Sherman of Eleven Companies, confirmed Clearwater has signed a six- month lease for space in the Post Office Centre located on Pelham Street.

The Clearwater transaction is the fourth major. deal signed on the Lunenburg waterfront properties since their acquisition by the WDC, following agreements with Sobeys, North Atlantic Sails and Lunar Fishing.


