

Next time there is a dance in the German Club, my friends and I will be there amidst


you, enjoying the "Gemuetlichkeit". All these dedicated men and woman who make these events possible deserve a heartfelt thank-you.



From May 30-31, 2008 the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany hosted a scientific conference in Montréal. Approximately 60 scientists from all parts of Canada who, at the beginning of their academic career, benefited from a scholarship of the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) or the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation (AvH) and spent part of their studies in Germany, attended the conference which was co-hosted by the DAAD and the AvH.

Through the organization of this conference, the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany provided the scientists with a forum for professional dialogue with their colleagues from other parts of Canada.

The conference focussed on recent developments in Germany particularly regarding the field of sustainable development and renewable energies. Dr. Günther Bachmann, Secretary General of the Berlin-based "German Council for Sustainable Development" (Rat für nachhaltige Entwicklung) and Prof. Dr. Heribert Nacken of the RWTH AAchen delivered the keynote speeches. Participants were given the opportunity to engage in detailed discussion during question and answer sessions and workshops.

During the informal part of the conference's program, the scientists shared their memories of the time spent in Germany as DAAD-/AvH-stipendiaries and fostered and reestablished their personal and professional ties to Germany as well as to their Canadian colleagues. (German Embassy)

German Political Scientist Hans-Dieter Klingemann Awarded John G. Diefenbaker Award To Work at Simon Fraser University

A prominent German scholar is coming to Canada to further his research on political representation and political identity. Hans-Dieter Klingemann, a Political Science professor at the Wissenschaftszentrum Berlin and Freie Universität Berlin, has been awarded this year's John G. Diefenbaker Award by the Canada Council for the Arts.

Dr. Klingemann will spend a year, from August 2008 to July 2009, at Simon Fraser University (Burnaby, BC), working with the Department of Political Science, where he will undertake two research projects. His first project will examine the role of left-right orientation in political representation across nations. It builds on earlier work in which he explored how ordinary citizens understand "left" and "right" politics, place political parties along the left-right continuum as well as how political parties formulate and emphasize issues and position them on the Hans-Dieter Klingemann left-right framework in their electoral campaigns.



Dr. Klingemann's second project on political identity will compare and contrast the Canadian experience, as a politically diverse and inclusive community in a multicultural setting, with the European challenges of identity and democratic legitimacy. Dr. Klingemann believes that Canada's experience can provide valuable insight for developing a political community in a culturally diverse society.

Given his past record of research collaboration and professional association in the international political science community, Dr. Klingemann's visit to Simon Fraser University is certain to bring tremendous value to our department and the whole Canadian political and social science community", wrote David Laycock, Professor and Chair of the Department of Political Science at Simon Fraser University, in his letter of support for Dr. Klingemann's nomination. "It is hard for us to imagine a more deserving or prestigious candidate for the award and we are very excited to work with him in Canada."

Established in 1991, the John G. Diefenbaker Award is an annual award honouring the memory of former Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker. It enables a scholar who is a German citizen to spend up to 12 months in Canada to pursue research in the social sciences and humanities. Candidates must be nominated by a university department or research institute in Canada. The value of the award is up to \$75,000 provided by the Canada Council for the Arts, plus a travel allowance of up to \$20,000 provided by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC). Funded by an endowment of approximately \$2 million from the Government of Canada, the award is administered by the Canada Council for the Arts.

Hans-Dieter Klingemann is one of the world's most renowned political scientists, having made major international contributions to the study of comparative political behaviour, party politics, and political ideologies. He explains how institutions in government and civil society interact with key citizen attitudes and beliefs in democratic politics. In his long career, Dr. Klingemann has authored 13 books, over 150 articles and book chapters and edited 22 scholarly volumes. He has been a principal investigator on over 20 major research grants.

He is a member of the German Academy of Sciences, a foreign member of the Finnish Academy of Science and Letters and holds two honorary doctorates. Dr. Klingemann has also been a visiting scholar at more than twelve universities across Europe and the United States, including an appointment as the Associate Director of Research at the Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris.

In addition to its principal role of promoting and fostering the arts in Canada, the Council administers and awards prizes and fellowships to over 150 artists and scholars annually in the arts, humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, health sciences and engineering. Among these are the Killam Prizes, the Killam Research Fellowships, the Molson Prizes, the Governor General's Literary Awards, the Governor General's Awards in Visual and Media Arts and the Walter Carsen Prize for Excellence in the Performing Arts. Quebec City and its enchanting setting in the St. Lawrence River Valley is celebrating the founding of Quebec 400 years ago



When Cartier came to visit Canada in 1534 and 1541, he discovered that Iroquois First Nation people and other First Nation people had lived in the St. Lawrence Valley a short time after 1000 AD. The arrival of Champlain

only half a century later in Quebec in 1608 can now be safely marked as the "beginning of a state". Canada then comprised a group of many people that came about with the Aboriginal people, the French, English, Irish, Scots and Germans.

Today, Quebec City shares with all Canadians and visitors from abroad its Article by Rolf Piro history, with gracious style

and culture from the 400 past years and this provides good reason for celebration. Politically things had never been stable at the time. This was proven in September 1760, with Quebec in British hands and Montreal surrounded, the surviving French troops went home. The British had imagined that a flood of settlement would soon help anglicize Quebec, but only a few people came. Then in 1760 the same year an estimated 220 German families settled along the St. Lawrence River. These families consisted of soldiers, seamen, artisans and army doctors, businessmen, doctors, surveyors, engineers, silversmiths and furriers who had come with British militias from New England; of which many rose to prominence in Quebec within fifteen years of their arrival.

When the American revolutionaries invaded Quebec after the Declaration of Independence in 1775, they had captured the City of Montreal, and

advanced to the fortress of Quebec City, where they had met a small defense team by Governor Guy Carleton. This determined defense team held out against all attacks until spring of 1776, when a British fleet

arrived with a large army of British and German troops. These experienced German troops had been trained at the military college in Kassel, Germany and helped to deprive the Americans of their victory. Then the landscape in Quebec changed when thousands of Loyalist refugees poured into the province coming up the old invasion route of the Richelieu River and across



the Niagara River. The seigneurs of Longueuil, Loyalists and German veterans of the war had been granted land. It is also well known that many Canadians including Franco Canadians treat their heritage of their forefathers from German speaking countries with highest interest and

The focal point of the celebration was to pay tribute to Champlain from a raft of dignitaries that included Governor General Michaelle Jean, Prime Minister Stephen Harper and French Prime Minister Francois Fillon.

In Toronto, Mayor David Miller pressed a button to ring the 50-bell carillon at Exhibition Place, on this "special day for Canadian cities to ring out together in celebration of how far we have come as a nation and as individual cities to look with faith and energy to the future".



Concordia Ottawa Sängerfest May 17-18, 2008



Concordia Male Choir of Ottawa, Canada

On the May 17-18 Victoria holiday week-end, the Concordia Ottawa Male Chorus hosted a Sängerfest at the Crowne Plaza Hotel. Concordia is celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2008 as is the Deutsch-Kanadischer Sängerbund (DKSB). Over 500 people and a total of 15 choirs joined in the festivities from Lacolle, Québec to the east and Windsor, Ontario to the west. This choral festival week-end was the second event (following upon a spring concert in April) in the Concordia Ottawa Male Chorus series of activities planned for their 50th anniversary year. A Sängerfest provides choir members, conductors and supporting friends with an opportunity to share in musical fellowship, to learn through fellowship, observation and participation, and to experience musical direction from a number of conductors with varying styles and techniques. (A few choirs sent a delegation rather than a full choir to participate in

the flag ceremony, the mass choir rehearsals and performances and, of course, report back on the festivities and lessons learned.)

The formal activities commenced with a reception in the fover off the International Ballroom at 16:30 followed by the honour-guard presentation of each choir's flag in a ceremony to start off the gala evening in the ballroom. After a five course dinner accompanied by a special anniversary wine for the occasion from Joseph's Estate Wines, the four individual male choirs in the DKSB each performed a variety of choral pieces followed by a combined male mass choir performance in a choral concert that was roundly applauded after each presentation. Following the concert, some individual awards were presented to over a dozen long-service individual singers of the DKSB who had up to 60 years of active choral participation behind them. The Edelweiß Kapelle from Montreal provided background music during the dinner period, dance music after the choral dance music after the choral

presentations and accompanied the Concordia Male Chorus in their closing number to the apparent enjoyment of the audience. During one of the group's dance breaks, the Concordia Kitchener Male Choir performed an amusing musical skit and during a subsequent break, Sylvia Schicker from the Teutonia Stratford Choir performed a solo with a Swiss yodel refrain, both to the great enjoyment of all attendees.

On Sunday morning, brunch was served in the hotel. The Harfentöne Male Choir from Toronto slipped out to participate musically in the St. Albertus Pfarrgemeinde Sunday mass celebration, while members of the remaining choirs held three choir practices (male, female and mixed mass choirs) in the Victoria Room and Ballroom of the hotel in preparation for the afternoon concert in the International Ballroom for approximately 750 attendees. Seven individual choirs performed, followed by the three mass choirs for a fine afternoon of

choral music that was greatly appreciated by all who attended. A Respected Builder - Manfred Holitzner, Founder of Holitzner Homes

Manfred Holitzner built more than 2,000 homes in Ottawa, earning the admiration of his work crews and the housing industry.

Manfred Holitzner earned the respect of his trades, colleagues in the housing industry and, most importantly, buyers.

He put Stittsville on the map and brought Holitzner Homes back from the edge of bankruptcy when

economic woes in 1995 dragged down competitors.

This master carpenter from Germany paid back his creditors, giving the family company, Holitzner Homes, another chance to build homes that carry a small brass H set into the front wall of each home.

Some called him obsessive about quality. It's a reputation he cultivated.

Holitzner died on Sunday at 75. He had been in failing health for several years.

Holitzner was trained as a master carpenter in his native Germany, and when he arrived in Canada in 1957 with his wife Cecilia, he knew he wanted to bring the European traditions of craftsmanship to his new country.

Early on, he worked with Ottawa builders, including Bill Teron and Robert Campeau. Soon he began building a small number of custom homes under the Holitzner banner.

By 1964, the couple founded Holitzner Homes, which, before his retirement three decades later, built more than 2,000 homes in the region.



The Holitzners sealed every home with a small brass plate that carried a stylized letter H, the mark of the family's devotion to quality, a plaque that still carries weight in the resale market.

Today, 44 years after the company was founded, Holitzner Homes carries on -- now run by his daughter Carmen Fleguel, and still animated by the notion that, for the builder, quality is the fundamental virtue.

There were many accolades from colleagues in the housing industry.

"Quality at any price is an objective that not many seek any more, but Manfred was certainly one who stuck by that," said John Herbert, executive director of the Greater Ottawa Home Builders' Association.

Holitzner served as president of the Ottawa-Carleton Home Builders' Association in 1980-81, also serving on the board of directors for many years.

Bob Sanscartier of S&S Electric, a company that worked closely with Holitzner, gave eloquent witness to his late friend's qualities as a man and a builder.

"Manfred had remarkable respect among all the tradesmen who worked with him. His devotion to quality was such that only the best tradespeople could work with him. And there was so much sheer respect for the man -- for his integrity, for the way he stood behind his word, for his belief that the quality and the performance given to the home buyer was the ultimate goal."

Paul Kruyne of Kott Lumber said Holitzner's integrity and loyalty to his tradesmen was probably the deciding factor that allowed Holitzner Homes to survive the downturn in the housing market back in 1995 that saw many other builders -- including MacDonald Homes -- fall into bankruptcy. His tradesmen could have petitioned him into bankruptcy, but did not.

"Manfred had great respect in the industry and we

Manfred Holitzner built had every faith that, given a little time, he and his fore than 2,000 homes in family could come through and reestablish ttawa, earning the themselves.

"We were glad to make sure he had a second chance -- and of course, the family proved that our faith was not misplaced," says Kruyne.

As a measure of the depths of the downturn, Holitzner built 31 homes in the first two months of 1994, but only four in the same period in 1995.

The Holitzners retired in '95 and the company was turned over to their daughters — Carmen Fleguel, who is now president, and Heidi Laurysen, who is a vice-president.

Holitzner Homes concentrated in the city's west end. "We put Stittsville on the map," he once said.

Though he was a perfectionist, Holitzner enjoyed the lighter side of life. Kruyne recalls many fishing trips with a joyful companion to La Verendrye Park in northem Quebec.

"He would be very entertaining, somehow always able to tell just where the fish were and always willing to have beer each time we caught a fish. You wouldn't see Manfred depressed very often, even during difficult times."

His daughter, Carmen, said her father's dedication to quality still animates the company.

"He always said we had to strive to be the best—and that meant a home had to have quality from the surface right down to the building's guts, to the foundation and the framing. His philosophy still guides us."

The funeral was held yesterday at St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church.

I remember one of the first times I met Manfred was at a dinner party at my future in-laws and we immediately hit it off. I was his favourite buddy that night since I was tending the bar, we both enjoyed a good drink and a laugh and in getting to know each other that evening he informed me that he was a Baron.

Now for those of you who know me – you know I was not going to let that one go without some form of teasing. So from that day forward I would always greet him as "The Baron or "Baron von Holitzner" and we would immediately start laughing and he would always respond with "Ya Peppe, you crazzy E-talian".

Manfred was a husband, father, Opa, brother, friend and respected businessman who was one of the driving forces in developing and making Stittsville, Barrhaven and Munster what they are today

In 1957 he immigrated to Canada with his wife Cecilia and shortly after in 1958 they founded M.Holitzner Limited as a framing/finishing firm and began to do work for Bill Teron & Robert Campeau.

In 1960 they began to build homes and the rest as they say became history. Over the years they established one of the most prestigious home building businesses in Ottawa and to this day a Holitzner house still proudly carries the Holitzner plaque.

President of the Ottawa Carleton Home Builders Association, Director of the German Canadian Business Association and member of the German Carnival provided him with an opportunity to give back to his industry and take pride in his German heritage.

Manfred was meticulous about his tools and like many of us if he did not have a tool he went out and bought one, as you can guess like the rest of us he had 3 of each.

In the past few years Florida became his favourite destination to combine his love of the outdoors, fishing and being in the south.

What many people did not know about Manfred was his secret desire to be a cowboy. He loved to watch the old Spaghetti westerns with Clint Eastwood and the Duke, curl up with a Louis L'Amour novel and watch Lonestar T.V. He would put on his cowboy boots and hat and feed his love of the old west, he could connect and relate with that spirit of pioneer ship.

His zest for life is very well known; Manfred never had a cold beer that he did not enjoy, a cigar that was not appreciated to its fullest or a Kott Fishing trip that did produce fun for all involved. Combine that with family and friends and you were about to have a memorable day with Manfred.

Much to his daughter's embarrassment and Cecilia's chagrin he would often put on his favourite outfit with a heart pasted on his backside and yodelling he proceeded to water ski down the lake at the cottage to everyone's delight.

Now with all this zest he was also very, very safety conscious to the point that on a number of snowmobile trips Bill and Barry figured that if anything ever did happen the safety gear would hurt him more then any fall ever could.

The cottage was his pride and joy, so closing the cottage took on legendary lock down proportions. As you can image the place was locked up like Fort Knox protecting the things that meant so much to him. To that end he probably has a little smile on his face today since the keys to the cottage can't be found – a small reminder that although he is gone we still need him for the little things.

Opa loved his grandchildren and his proudest moments were stories and accomplishments that Vanessa, Corey, Sara, Michael and Charmaine, would relate to him. He relished hearing about their successes and took pride in the accomplishments that they shared with him.

The legacy of Holitzner Homes was passed on to his daughter's Carmen and Heidi and his attention to detail and his high standards for quality homes is being carried on by his son in law Barry.

In Cecilia he found a devoted wife, partner and friend who stood by him to the end and her undying love comforted him until the last moment. Their marriage was 52 years of good times, hard times, happy memories and the creation of a family that proudly sits loving and missing a very special person.

The family would like to take this time to thank Tina, Manfred's caregiver who provided compassion and strength during the most trying of times.

Over the past 18 years I was able to get to know the Baron and count myself fortunate to have met him and to have been able to call Manfred my friend.

I would like us all to remember Manfred doing what he loved the most, being at his cottage, enjoying his fishing and preparing amazing meals on the BBQ wearing his cowboy boots with a smile on his face, a beer in hand ready to provide another good day to be enjoyed by his family and us his friends.



Unionville, die Kleinstadt mit dem "aha"-Erlebnis Darbietungen mit charmanten Aufführungen für Abwechslung und Kurzweil



Lorne Smith and Great Pennsylvanian German Heritage

Die historische Kleinstadt Unionville unweit von Toronto gelegen, hat dieses Jahr wieder die Tradition seiner vergangenen Tage "im Berczy Country" gefeiert. Zum diesjährigen Dorf Fest sind 70,000 Besucher gekommen um neue Freunde kennenzulernen oder alte Freundschaften aufzufrischen.

Unionville's historische Bedeutung geht auf die Gründungsjahre von 1794 zurück, als das Lagerhaus der North West Trade Company für den damaligen Pelzhandel eine wichtige Rolle in der Geschichte von Ontario spielte.

Das Lagerhaus wurde von seinem Stadtgründer William Moll Berczy in 1794 erstellt, um unter dem damaligen Tauschwirtschaft System in Ontario die ersten geplanten Bauprojekte finanzieren zu können. Ein schillerndes Beispiel ist, wie aus den alten Plänen der im National Archiv von

Ottawa befindlichen "Berczy Papers" noch zu ersehen ist, eine Verbindung zwischen Lake Ontario und Lake Simcoe auf dem Wasserweg herzustellen, und zwar über den Rouge River. Das sind Sternstunden in der Geschichte von Ontario, weil es zu dieser Zeit noch keine funktionsfähige Banken in Kanada gab. Das North West Trade Lagerhaus steht heute nicht mehr und der genaue Standort muss von den Historikern noch erforscht werden.

Der Festzug ist immer eine historische Sehenswuerdigkeit. Der Conestoga-Wagen der Pennsylvanien Deutsche Siedler aus der Umgebung von Unionville, ein Pionierfahrzeug, neckisch manchmal auch der "Volkswagen des 18ten Jahrhunderts" genannt, fand bei dieser Parade unter der Bevölkerung viel Beachtung. Claus Reuter kam mit sechs Soldaten, die in traditioneller Braunschweiger Uniform gekleidet waren. Dessen Bedeutung ist auf die Frühzeit von Ober-Kanada mit dem bekannten General deutscher Hilfstruppen, Adolf von Riedesel, der auf Seiten der Engländer in Kanada diente, zurückzu führen. Tagesgespräch war, wenn auch etwas verspätet, die Ernennung von Cindy Schickedanz als "2007 Markham Fair Ambassador", eine Position, die auch mit dem Unionville Stadtfest verbunden ist. Die in Kanada

Cindy Schickedanz ist Urenkelin der bekannten Baufamilie Schickedanz, dessen Urvater aus Tilsit in Ostpreussen kam.


