

In 1980s Germany at the height of the Cold War, 19-year-old Karl Koch (August Diehl) finds the world around him threatening and chaotic. Inspired by the fictitious character Hagbard Celine (from Robert Anton Wilson and Robert Shea's Illuminatus! Trilogy), he starts investigating the backgrounds of political and economic power and discovers signs that make him believe in a worldwide conspiracy

At a meeting with hackers, Karl gets to know the student David (Fabian Busch). David and Karl are able to hack into the global data network—which is still, at this point, in its early stages—and their belief in social justice propels them into espionage for the KGB. Driven by contacts with a drug dealer—and by increasing KGB pressure to hack successfully into foreign systems—Karl spirals into a cocaine dependency and grows increasingly alienated from David.

In a drug-addled state, Karl begins to sit in front of his computer for days at a time. Perpetually sleepless, he also grows increasingly delusional. When David publicly reveals the espionage activity in which the two men have been engaged, Karl is left alone to face the consequences. Collapse soon follows. Karl is taken to a hospital to deal with his drug addiction and mysteriously dies afterward. Review - wikipedia

This German documentary records how a girls' soccer team from Berlin (BSV Al-Dersimpoor) dreams, plans and realizes a trip to Iran to compete against the Iranian national women's team. The film spans the course of a year during which the Kreuzberg team faces numerous obstacles with the Iranian government. In the end though, we view the actual game attended by a thousand cheering women spectators. It is an atmosphere of women's lib in spite of the totally men's

world outside the stadium. Besides soccer practices and Ayat's and Marlene's initial organizational trip to Teheran, we see some good coverage of the young women on a personal level – even one of the Iranian players who, unfortunately, wasn't chosen to play in the big game. Die Vermessung der Welt:Friday, November 14th
Cinema, director: Detlef Buck, Farbe, 119 Min.,2011/12.
Two brilliant 18th Century German scientists – each having measured the world in their own way – are the subjects of David Kehlmann's bestseller "The Measuring of the World" that this film (by Detlev Buck) is based on. Fact and fiction are blended into a hilarious – if a little disrespectful – fictitious double-biography.

Methometrician Corl Friedrich Corl (1777 1855) a shild predict born into a

double-biography.

Mathematician Carl Friedrich Gauß (1777-1855), a child prodigy born into a poor family, conceived his major discoveries by the age of 17 – all without ever leaving his home state. Scientific explorer Alexander von Humboldt (1769-1859), born into a wealthy family, was more of a late bloomer; but once he found his calling, set out to travel the world over to examine "everything that didn't have legs nor fear to get away from him". A story about measuring the world – with luscious sets (by Udo Kramer) and exotic locations – begs to be filmed in 3-D. "Krabat" is based on the German novel of the same name by Offried Preußler.

When the Plague sweeps across Europe, a young man named Krabat (David Kross of "The Reader") is left without family, food, or hope. An old Mill Keeper takes him in offering the basic necessities in exchange for grueling hard work with other young men. An excursion with fellow worker, Tonda (Daniel Brühl of "Inglorious Basterds") leads to a chance meeting with a pretty girl in the nearby village and affections grow. A veil of secrecy remains shrouded over the mill. Eventually, after proving his obedience, Krabat learns that the Mill Keeper holds them all there with something more seductive than food and shelter. The boys are being trained in the dark art of sorcery. The magic is intoxicating and gives Krabat his first taste of real power. his first taste of real power.

As he is taken into the fold, Tonda warns him, "Everything in this world has its price". He discovers that to be involved in the magic at the mill one must have no outside friends, no girlfriends, and no choices beyond what the Master chooses for you. As the magic becomes increasingly dark and more secrets are revealed, Krabat tries to escape only to discover too late he can never leave.







What they found were not fertile grounds but barren, stony land, unsuitable for agriculture, between nearly impenetrable thick growth of beautiful, tall trees. But the Germans, used to hard work and with strong hands, succeeded in building the small settlement of High Falls - named after the 130meter high Waterfall on its door - with their own school, store, post office; church and cemetery, even a covered

wooden bridge between their hub and the neighboring community of Bowman. The bridge was later dismantled and another covered bridge built further north, to connect Bowman with Val-des-Bois.

Within years, small-sized farms with rich crop and pretty little farm houses beautified the countryside and in defiance of suffering and hardship, the settlement grew to about 800 people, even so many of the young farmers had to look for work outside their community.

The death knell for the settlement sounded in 1929, when the MacLaren Power-Dam on the Lievre was built and great parts of the farmland in the vicinity of the river, affecting High Falls, Bowman and Val des Bois, began to flood. (The flooding affected 156 farming families, the majority of them German immigrant settlers, the average amount the families received from the MacLaren Co. were, depending on the acreage, between \$ 1000.-- to \$ 2000 each. The flooding created the reservoir known as Lescalier.)

The German settler, who had started half a century earlier to built his farmstead, now had to abandon everything he had worked for so long and hard, had to see his livelihood sink below the murky waters; a uncertain future

With compensation from the MacLaren Company, they packed their meagre belongings and moved to fertile lands in southern Ontario, while the others re-settled in their immediate neighbourhood.

The church building and parsonage were floated by raft across the rising waters of the new dam to their current place in Bowman, QC.

This September 28. 2014, just a few miles from the original High Falls, in the small graveyard behind St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Bowman, Mayor Michel David and the councillors of the Municipality of Bowman, who were so instrumental in word and deed to get this project afloat, together with the representatives of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, the families and friends of the German descendants will gather for a small ceremony to erect a plaque in memory of the 95 High Falls settlers, 17 of them infants, whose graves sunk beneath the waters.

As the High Falls cemetery stood on somewhat higher grounds, forming an island, it became known as "Cemetery Island". Some of these gravestones - perhaps a dozen or so - were preserved but became damaged throughout the years. From keeping them being further vandalized they were transferred by boat to their current place in the cemetery of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Bowman during the early 1990's.

To illustrate that the legend of the German settlement of High Falls - once shunned by inaccessibility, language, beliefs and customs - still lives on today shows the following vignette.

On the evening of September 28. 2013 at the Salle "des Chevaliers de Colomb" in Val des Bois, the "Movement Art et Culture" Val des Bois and Bowman presented an amusing three-act play (in French) by M.Pierre Valois, a widely respected historian, in celebration of the IOOth anniversary of the municipality of Bowman-Villeneuve, titled "Le Pont de l'eglise" (The bridge by the church) It depicts an altercation, taking place during the late 1800's, between two councillors, the German, Mr. Karl Nitschke of Bowman and the French Canadian, M. Charles Morin of Villeneuve what color should be used for painting the new bridge. Mr. Nitschke wanted rouge and M. Morin

decided to opt for "blue". Both blockheads stood their ground until finally 'Le cure' had the final say, Bowman won, the bridge was painted red.

NOTE: The skills required for this sport are so close to those of small bore and full bore shooting that many athletes use the Air Rifle as an indoor winter sport to practice for the outdoor seasons. Air Rifle is shot at 10 metres distance using a target with a 10 ring of 0.4mm (approximately the diameter of a pin head) and the 9 ring is just slightly larger than the .177¢ diameter of the pellet. With a bull's-eye the size of a pinhead, this is no casual "plinking" sport. Air Rifle is shot by both men and women in competitions from club level to the Olympic Games. This discipline first made its debut at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

Amrikaner besser entgegnen zu defensive Landstreitkräfte der Briten sind durch Kämpfe in Spanien und dem Napoleon Krieg gebunden gewesen und schwach in Ober Kanada. Zur Ansiedlung von Tausenden von Bauern und Handwerkern auf einem Gebiet mit 1 Million Acker Land in Süd Ontario wurde der Regierung von Ober Kanada der Plan vorgelegt. Dieser Plan hatte darauf abgezielt, die Agrarwirtschaft mit tausenden von Siedlern in Süd Ontario zu bevölkern. Berczy, der schon wertvolle Erfahrungen im Landmanagement erworben hatte, hatte die notigen Kontakte in Europa. 

Wichtige Kriegsnachricht an die Britischen Truppen von John Christopher Reiffenstein im "Laura Secord Stiel"

Alte Kirchendokumente der Moraviar Mission und Zeitungen aus der Provinz Quebec belegen, daß John Christopher Reiffenstein ein Berufssoldat gewesen ist und aus der adeligen Familie von Thurn und Taxis stammt. Reiffenstein diente bei den englischen Truppen in Kanada und hat den Tod vom Shawneeführer Tecoumseh miterlebt.

Während seiner Militärzeit war Reiffenstein mit General Proctor in Detroit und Amherstburg. Dort wurde mit der unzureichenden Versorgungslage bestens vertraut. Auch war ihm bekannt, dass die Versorgungslage von General Proctor's Truppen einen amerikanischen Invasionsangriff nicht aufhalten kann. Wegen der u n z u r e i c h e n d e n un zureiten einen dem dem Lebensmittelversorgung mußte General Proctor später einen unvermeidlichen Rückzug machen. Bei diesem Rückzug sind massenweise Siedler gefolgt. Proctors Militerprocten vor mit dem Militaerposten war mit dem Militärposten in Burlington nicht zu vergleichen. Burlington wurde laufend von vielen Stellen im Niagara Gebiet mit Proviant versorgt, was dem Militärposten in Amherst nicht beschieden war. Reiffenstein hatte sich auf einen 240 Kilometer Weg durch einen schwierig bewältigenden Urwald von Fairfield nach Burlington begeben, um das Britische Militär zu warnen. Dazu hatte Laura Secord die heute als Heroine gefeiert wird, um das Militär zu warnen nur 20 Kilometer laufen müssen

Reiffenstein berichtete dem Militär in Burlington, dass 8,000 amerikanische Truppen unterwegs sind. Weil die wirkliche Zehl nur 6,000 Truppen gewesen ist, wurde Reiffenstein vor ein Kriegsgericht gestellt, jedoch später mit allen Ehren freigesprochen. Berczy und Reiffenstein haben es verdient in den kanadischen Geschichtsbuechern, wenn auch jetzt nach mehr wie 200 Jahren, einen Platz zu finden.
