

From 1860 to 1929! The above plaque lists 96 peoples by burial date (from 1860 to 1929) in the orginal High Falls Cemetery. The plaque is located in the graveyard behind St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Bowman, Quebec. Mayor Michael David stated he was not aware of this German settlement until he read Ann Schnurr's book "Tracing Their Footsteps". Mayor David and his councillors of the Municipality of Bowman, were instrumental in taking action for this plaque dedication.



In loving memory of the 96 men, women and children of the German settlement of High Falls, whose graves were swallowed by the rising waters of the Lievre River in 1930.

In the early 1860's the then Dominion Government directed 18 German families to the shores of High Falls on the banks of the Lievre River, to clear the land and build their homesteads.

homesteads.
The first 5 German names were found in the land-grants of Bowman Township in 1861. The self-contained German settlement of High Falls was officially incorporated in the Township of Bowman in 1871, their homesteads loosely connected to its Center with their own church, cemetery, school, store and Post-office. High Falls grew and prospered from 80 members in 1871 to 141 in 1891, but developed slower in the following years due to shortage of available land for the 36 families and 171 members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in 1922. The tireless invaluable research in Anne Schnurr's book was instrumential in

After the erection of the MacLaren power dam in 1930 and in preparation of the impendent flooding of High Falls and surroundings, all residents had to leave their homesteads and relocate, while 41 of these families chose to stay in neighbouring communities.

The gravestones of the higher situated High Falls cemetery emerged on a small island, later named Cemetery Island. In the late 1980's the gravestones were re-assembled in the present St. Paul Lutheran Church Cemetery in Bowman

On September 28, 2014, the municipality of Bowman, in partnership with St. Paul's Lutheran Church and Brookfield Renewable Energy, erected this memorial to perpetuate the memory of the 96 people who to this day still rest in the ground of Cemetery Island.



Just a few miles from the original High Falls, the families and friends of the German descendants gathered for a ceremony to erect a plaque in memory of the 96 High Falls settlers, 17 of them infants, whose graves sunk beneath the waters. In 1929, the MacLaren Power-Dam on the Lievre River was built and great parts of the farmland in the vicinity of the river flooded affecting 156 farming families of High Falls, Bowman and Val des Bois! 

### Germany's vintage 2014 After High-Speed Harvest, Good Wine Quality in the Cellar

Reports pouring in from around Germany indicate that this year's wine harvest is coming to an unusually rapid and early end. The next few days are expected to see many estates harvest their top quality berries in late-ripening varieties such as Riesling.

In conversations with the German Wine Institute (DWI), producers have indicated overall satisfaction with the quality of the harvested fruit.

The year began with an extremely early flowering, leading to significantly accelerated development of the vegetation. Despite the rapid harvest, ripeness levels for the collected fruit appear to be strong, suggesting a high-quality vintage.

The latest estimates see this year's harvest yielding volumes slightly above the well-established annual national average of 9.2 million hectoliters of must. If those forecasts prove true, Germany's winemakers will be able to both serve normal market demand and refresh inventories after the relatively small 2013 vintage.

In the DWI's view, the rapid pace of the harvest was necessitated by a variety of difficult external factors that at times required rigorous, careful selection and manual harvesting in the vineyards. This included the first German sighting of the Drosophila suzukii, a fruit crop pest, leading to a highly accelerated red wine harvest in some regions. White wine varieties fortunately were unaffected by this new invader.

The weather conditions in September and October were also major factors, with periods of heavy rain and moist, warm temperatures demanding lots of attention in the vineyards. Advance expenditures in higher efficiency harvesting and processing tools were especially valuable this year. A number of estates have made these investments in

recent years in response to climate change and the extreme weather that comes with it. In an often tough year, the new equipment allowed many winegrowers to react quickly and head off problems.

Three weeks exploring Bavaria. Visiting many different places, famous for one thing or another, and nearly 2 weeks of daily explorations in the Bavarian metropolis Munich. On a dry day with the temp. around 20° the enclosed courtyard of the Hofbräuhaus is a very colourful and very attractive spot to lunch. The other not to miss adventure is the approx. 700 year old Augustiner Großgaststätte, which started life as part of the Augustiner from year old a very entry. Wow wee! WOW?! Wiesenfest (talk has it, its visible with the naked eye from space, not that I've been in those lofty heights.)



### **Bavaria & Oktoberfest**



All's wonderful. You say, been there, done that. NO, you haven't. Not unless you've been at the Oktoberfest.

Now I've been. Now I've done that, and then some.

So that's what it's like. Le grand hoopla of all times.

The planet's people all in one spot. In one day. The day I was there. It had to be. In this ocean of humanity snails move faster, believe me.

Getting around at the Oktoberfest, which takes place on the large Theresienwiese (Theresia Meadow), was a tiresome activity. And I saw the Theresienwiese empty in May of '12. Then it was just an unimpressive super-huge enclosed empty lot. No turf at all, what one would expect a meadow to look like, only a gravelly surface.

And now, on the days I was attending the Oktoberfest, who cares about the footing. It's Carnival time in Munich. Forget Disneyland. Forget the WC (World Cup).

The Oktoberfest is situated very nearly downtown.

First the parades; then the now so named traditional outfits – Dirndl & Lederhosen, the "Trachten Parade" as it were.



Then there is the commercial Oktoberfest fashion, where a Dirndl hemline is kneelength.

Some, if not most, foreign visitors to the Oktoberfest really have no concept of the tradition, the wearing of the period attire, a true stately Bavarian dress. The fashion copies are insulting to the true Bavarian. Bavarians are definitely well aware of the history of the Tracht. The Dirndl dresses, now known as traditional dresses for the ladies, are ankle length. Shorter Dirndl (knee length or even above) are not traditional, more of a commercial variety, Foreigners to Bavaria are seen in this variety, also local teenagers, which

leads to the belief they are not familiar with the rich traditions and customs of Bavarian life. The "traditional dress" is something that was worn every day, day in, day out, several hundred years ago. It was not any special ceremonial dress; it's just the way they dressed back then. Trachten are also worn in other parts of the country, not only in Bavaria. In Bavaria it's Dirndl and Lederhosen (usually knee- or below-knee length with either knee- or short socks).



The dressed-up sexes, in their very special garments, is breathtaking. You know how you feel in your Sunday best. Well, that's so obvious to observe at the Oktoberfest. Especially the little ones, the under 10 year olds and the up-to-adulthood youngens. The older crowd (50 and up) are a joy to observe as well, wearing their garments with much pride. I am standing in the crowd with the camera at the ready, missing, I think, many a good shot.

Only shortly after the Oktoberfest was opened (in the pouring rain) with the parade of the Wirte (hosts or managers) of the individual beer tents and their personnel, on the Saturday, all the many beer tents had been closed because of overcrowding. This opening parade is really the formal, ceremonial entry onto the grounds of the people who work in the tents, from the manager on down to the waitresses and waiters.



Besides the beer tents are rides upon rides, one more dangerous than the next one. It's what Ottawans knew as the annual Ex at Lansdowne Park. The O-grounds are very, very loud with the noise of the crowd; you can hardly hear yourself think. Add to the many rides a large variety of food stands along the midways; bottle drinks carry a deposit of 1 or 2 euros to prevent the bottles strewn all over.

Astonishingly, the grounds were clean; no litter or garbage of any description anywhere. About the cleanliness on the grounds of the Oktoberfest. It's a small miracle that the grounds appear to stay clean, because there are no trash cans. After the attack on the Oktoberfest (26 Sept. 1980), all trash cans were removed. They've never returned. It's now a custom that trash is "deposited" at light poles.

The Saturday crowd had to be in the neighbourhood of 500,000 and more (not counting the masses in the large beer tents). Sunday, nearly a million people crowded the Oktoberfest grounds, the Theresienwiese. Locals call it simply the Wiesn.



On Sunday I managed entry into the Schottenhamel tent, one of the larger ones. In total there are 14 large tents and 23 smaller tents of various descriptions, eateries, etc. It was a never before experienced spectacle. In the Schottenhamel tent, Youngens, seasoned Bavarians and foreigners, practically all are in various states of intoxication but are dressed to the nines in Dirndl and Lederhosen, standing on picnic table benches making hoopla noises drowning out the brass band trying its damndest to entertain. In all the tents it's approx, the same scenario. Besides the crowd inside the tents, the beer gardens beside the tents are also filled to capacity, unless of course it's raining. The larger tents have immense capacities, up to 8000 and more. The Winzerer Fähndl is the largest tent, with a capacity of almost 8450 and seats for an additional 2450 in its garden.



Seating/tables in an O-tent must be reserved (which incl. other conditions as well) months in advance.

I know of the immense tent crowds from attending the Rosenheim Fall festival last year, which has 2 tents, each with just shy of 9000 capacity, including the outside beer garden.

The Rosenheim Fall Festival is a forerunner to the Oktoberfest. It should be mentioned that the Oktoberfest and the Rosenheimer Fest are just two of many that take place in every town and village of Bavaria each summer. They're equivalent to the North American county fairs. The only one people outside of Bavaria know is, of course, the Oktoberfest.



The Sunday parade (in somewhat better weather conditions, no rain) consisted of shooting clubs, Trachtenvereine (period dress clubs) from all over Europe, brass bands a plenty, several horse drawn hay-wagons loaded with beer barrels of the various breweries, the Mayor Dieter Reiter and the Governor of the State of Bavaria Horst Seehofer rolled, marched, walked, danced and rode by endlessly – three hours.

In summary then, the Oktoberfest is like the Ottawa Ex used to be, only a 100 times larger with better than a dozen beer – and a variety of other tents.

The humongous humanity in Munich (normally 1.2 mill. citizens) and the Oktoberfest is overwhelming, it's similar to an overcrowded beehive. The public transpo is an engineering marvel. There are four commuter types, the U-

(Subway), the S-Bahn (suburban railway), buses & trams, streetcars by another name. The cycle of the various lines are in 5 to 10 min. intervals and are always full. And all are amazingly on schedule.



The trains of the U4 and U5 are 113.98 metres long, the entire length of a station's platform. The U4 & U5 bring people to the Oktoberfest once every two minutes. It's not possible to run them any more frequently, because people can't get on and off any faster than that. http://www.muenchnerubahn.de/fahrzeuge/c/



Some escalators to the U- or S-Bahn are very, very long (seems like 4 stories deep/high, depending on where you get on) and please stand to the right if you don't want get pushed to the side by people rushing by on your left. Everybody is rushing to somewhere.

The Munich experience of 2014 will last a lifetime.

Ottawa by comparison seems like a provincial hick-town with an attitude to match.

And still, I think, Ottawa is a great place to live in, thank you very much.





### Die Vermessung der Welt: Friday, November 14th

Cinema, director: Detlef Buck, Farbe, 119 Min., 2011/12.

Two brilliant 18th Century German scientists – each having measured the world in their own way – are the subjects of David Kehlmann's bestseller "The Measuring of the World" that this film (by Detlev Buck) is based on. Fact and fiction are blended into a hilarious – if a little disrespectful – fictitious double-biography.

Mathematician Carl Friedrich Gauß (1777-1855), a child prodigy born into a poor family, conceived his major discoveries by the age of 17 – all without ever leaving his home state. Scientific explorer Alexander von Humboldt (1769-1859), born into a wealthy family, was more of a late bloomer; but once he found his calling, set out to travel the world over to examine "everything that didn't have legs nor fear to get away from him". A story about measuring the world – with luscious sets (by Udo Kramer) and exotic locations – begs to be filmed in 3-D. Unfortunately this was unsatisfactorily left to Slawomir Idziak (camera): in some scenes the characters appear "Gulliver-esquely" tiny, in others angles and focus disappoint. "Krabat" is based on the German novel of the same name by Otfried Preußler.

When the Plague sweeps across Europe, a young man named Krabat (David Kross of "The Reader") is left without family, food, or hope. An old Mill Keeper takes him in offering the basic necessities in exchange for grueling hard work with other young men. An excursion with fellow worker, Tonda (Daniel Brühl of "Inglorious Bastards") leads to a chance meeting with a pretty girl in the nearby village and affections grow. A veil of secrecy remains shrouded over the mill. Eventually, after proving his obedience, Krabat learns that the Mill Keeper holds them all there with something more seductive than food and shelter. The boys are being trained in the dark art of sorcery. The magic is intoxicating and gives Krabat his first taste of real power.


As he is taken into the fold, Tonda warns him, "Everything in this world has its price". He discovers that to be involved in the magic at the mill one must have no outside friends, no girlfriends, and no choices beyond what the Master chooses for you. As the magic becomes increasingly dark and more secrets are revealed, Krabat tries to escape only to discover too late he can never leave.

NOTE: The skills required for this sport are so close to those of small bore and full bore shooting that many athletes use the Air Rifle as an indoor winter sport to practice for the outdoor seasons. Air Rifle is shot at 10 metres distance using a target with a 10 ring of 0.4mm (approximately the diameter of a pin head) and the 9 ring is just slightly larger than the .177¢ diameter of the pellet. With a bull's-eye the size of a pinhead, this is no casual "plinking" sport. Air Rifle is shot by both men and women in competitions from club level to the Olympic Games. This discipline first made its debut at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.
